This year, our Kāhui Ako has breathed new life into our achievement challenges, centering our efforts around the goals of Whakawhanaungatanga and Akongia. Our learning and activities have aligned with the indicators of these challenges, fostering meaningful connections and deepening knowledge across our community. Each term, schools hosting hui have built their events around these indicators.

Our year began with collaborative workshops (co-labs) led by our Kāhui Ako leads. These sessions allowed teachers to explore topics of personal interest. This opportunity not only highlighted the unique approaches within our community but also reinforced the importance of coming together to honour and learn from one another during this significant time of reflection and renewal.

What's been happening:

1. Leadership coaching with Greg Jansen:

This term, we held another round of bespoke in-school leadership coaching sessions with Greg Jansen from Leadership Lab. Several middle leaders had the opportunity to work with Greg to review their current knowledge and leadership practices and then work on developing next-step plans. While Greg was here he also ran an afterschool session for WSLs and Principals on Thursday, November 14. Participants reviewed steps leaders go through when developing their skills, ways to individualise interactions with their team, a model for discussing different perspectives, and a way to reframe the language in Lencioni's five dysfunctions of a team. Everyone left with new pieces of learning and some next-step actions.

We look forward to continuing our work with Greg and Dan in the early part of 2025.

2. Year 8 Taster Days:

Almost 270 Year 8 students came through the High School for a 'taster' experience last week. Students rotated around 4 different sessions, varying between Science, Agriculture, Music, Drama and Technology - depending on the availability of space and staff. These sessions were followed by morning tea and an 'all-in' PE session, where students took part in sports performance classes or general PE sessions. We were lucky with the weather all week except Friday - which was a real shame. Students finished the experience with a BBQ and then returned to their normal schools with a full stomach.

The objective of this experience was simple - to gain familiarity with FAHS and reduce anxiety about the unknown. All students walked around the campus, met various staff, interacted with current High School students and got a glimpse of what their future subjects may look and feel like.

The jump to High School is a big one for most; few of us have forgotten our first day. With a little more experience and knowledge, we hope our future Year 9s will start with confidence and courage in 2025.

3. New Zealand Council For Educational Research:

A huge thank you to all the schools that have approved the collated use of their Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) data. A site has been activated which holds summary information regarding our rohe. The data is not school-specific but gives a general overview. If you are a Te Kāhui Ako ō Kawakawa kura and you have yet to approve the use of your data please get in touch. The more tamariki we have included in the data the better the picture we get and the more targeted and responsive the Kāhui Ako can be. In the new year, Ben will hold a session to present the information that can be extrapolated.

4. Wearable Arts:

A few weeks ago, on November 7 our Kahui Ako was excited to showcase our first-ever Wearable Arts event at North Street School. This initiative allowed students to develop their talents and showcase their creations in front of our local community. The theme for this year was "Ignite the light." More than 10 local schools were involved with 40 costumes entered and over 100 designers who helped with these creations. The hall was packed with nearly 300 people from across the community. Congratulations to all the students across the community, the costumes were amazing and we were very proud of you all.
